

News Update for August 10, 2020

The sermon from August 9:

So there are three really important takeaways from this lesson today. Number one, as Christians, we are adrift until we notice that Jesus is walking beside us.

Number two, we know that this is really important scripture, because Jesus uses "I am" language. Remember when Moses had a little visit with God and God said, "I am who I am."

And number three, and this may be the most important part for us today, and that is “when even the wind is against you, take Jesus' hand.”

So, this is a fabulous story. It reads well if you just say, “I'm just going to read it as a nice story,” but there are some really important things going on. Like I said, Jesus uses that “I am” language, and Peter and all the disciples recognize that this is a 'Son of God' moment.

And, in fact, when they get back to the boat, Jesus is there. The disciples are all worshiping him and they say, “You are the Son of God,” which is the exact same language that the centurion uses at the foot of the cross at the time that Jesus is crucified. ("Truly this man was the Son of God.") Exact same language. So, the author who writes Matthew wants us to see that connection between the saving grace of Jesus out there on the water holding Peter by the hand, and the saving grace of Jesus at the cross, not withholding his life, because we are worth not the sacrifice, but we are worth making the point that Jesus loves us, even though, humankind is willing to go so far as to kill the Son of God. That's how deeply we had fallen into sin, and Jesus wants us to see that.

So we have some really important lessons in this beautiful story, lessons that we are loved and cared for like when we're sinking, and I can't imagine there is anyone among us who hasn't had the feeling in the past few weeks that they are about to have the water slip over their head.

We're only this far out of the water, and its getting deeper and deeper, and then there's Jesus to take our hand and to comment that even if we have little faith, it is still worth Jesus' time to take our hand, take us out of the water and back into the boat, and for us to get where we are going. Even though we have been wind-battered and stuck in this weird place, it is time for us to take Jesus' hand.

So, remember the three lessons? We are adrift until we notice that Jesus is walking beside us. Jesus uses the "I am" language so that we can understand that the Son of God loves even us. And, last but not least, when even the wind is against you, take Jesus' hand. Amen.

A message from Lay Pastor Ryan Atwood

It is a strange time to be a new pastor. For those who don't know, in July I started a new position as the lay pastor assigned to the UMC churches in Chubbuck, American Falls and Aberdeen.

Before I get too much into what that's been like, I do want to take a moment to thank all of you. This new opportunity that I am so happy to have would have never been possible without the love and support that my church family here at Trinity have shown.

The covid virus has been a part of my new position since before I began the work. Like Trinity, my churches have been physically closed down for months, but their situation also left them without alternate options for church services.

Their beloved Pastor Davey Lefler had passed away in December, and until I started in July, they had not had a pastor, relying on volunteers to preach each week up until the church closures, and after that had pretty much gone silent. With no web presence for a video church, they were staying in the Word by watching videos or receiving printed sermons from other churches, but they had no weekly service of their own.

When I first heard about the prospect of serving these churches, I got used to, embraced, and even romanticized the idea of spending Sunday mornings on the road, driving from church to church, picturing myself as a modern-day circuit rider, with my Ford Taurus as my trusty steed. For my first Sunday service, instead of preaching to their welcoming faces from within each of their three beautiful churches, I found myself in a chair in my apartment, preaching to the webcam in my laptop.

One of the churches is so remote that the small congregation consists of eight people who do not have computers or internet access, so, for them, I've been printing out a transcript of each week's service and mailing it.

Each challenge has brought me the chance to learn new skills and find new ways to look at parts of church that I had taken for granted. I am learning something that I'm sure Pastor Ruth has known for years, that a pastor has to rely on the skills, knowledge, and willingness to serve of the members of the congregation. In the 4 short weeks since I began the job, I've had to lean on the support of church board leaders, the choir director and the pianist, and on volunteers willing to film themselves for weekly liturgy.

As I get further into this new venture, I'm discovering new strengths and abilities I didn't know I had, and in the opportunity for service, I'm finding a joy I never knew I could experience.

I think that these lessons I'm learning as a new pastor mirror what people all around the world are seeing in their jobs, their churches and their lives. We're all having to find new ways to work, new ways to communicate, new ways to gather.

That also means new opportunities, new ways to serve, new ways to show God's love to our families, our friends, our churches, and communities.

In these uncertain times, I implore you to look for new ways to love one another, to serve those in need and to be in fellowship with each other.


